This collection of 27 historically dressed miniature dolls was initiated by Sheila Zerr to raise funds for history of nursing scholarships. It also promotes history of Nursing as a visual, lasting portrait to honour a friend or family member. All of the dolls, with a couple of exceptions, were exquisitely hand crafted by Sheila who carefully researched each one to ensure authenticity. The

collection honours nurses who shaped nursing in BC and will be permanently displayed in the Helen Randal Library.

The highlight of the evening was the presentation by Sheila who told us the story of each doll. Donors came forward and were given a beautiful book with photographs of the collection. Ray Zerr was thanked for his valuable contribution as well as David Roberts who photographed the collection and designed the stunning book. A special thank you was given to Sheila for her dedication to History of Nursing and her pursuit of the Scholarship fund which raised \$13,500.00. Archives ANNUAL REPORT Respectfully submitted by Lois M. Blais, Chair.

GOAL: Our goal is to have a provincial history of nursing center in the Lower Mainland that is linked online with other agencies and /or schools of nursing in the province holding nursing artifacts or other archival materials. The provincial center will be an archival museum with easy access for nurses and the general public. It will house our provincial nursing archives, oral history tapes, biographies of our nursing leaders, and artifacts that we have collected. It will also include a virtual museum online and will maintain an online catalogue of artifacts and other archival items held by the BC History of Nursing Group, as well as those held by other BC agencies.

OBJECTIVES: The Archival Committee initiatives are the second most important function of the History of Nursing Professional Practice Group of the RNABC. The long-term objective is to establish a "Home of Our Own" as outlined in our goal above. The short-term objective for the year 2003 was to continue to update the database and process donations of holdings and collections as acquired.

ACTIONS

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- Through a motion from the Archival Committee to the History of Nursing Executive Committee, Melanie Hardbattle (Archivist) is retained for another year and a half and to raise her salary to \$24 per hour with a maximum amount of \$2000 per year.
- The Policies and Procedures outlined in the Policies and Procedure Manual were reviewed for ease of use and wording as per recommended in a motion from 2002.
- A process for notifying the Archives Office at UBC and directions for requesting information an
 accessing holdings was developed and published in the History of Nursing Newsletter and placed on
 the History of Nursing Website.
- Several requests have been processed from the Website and the telephone answering service over the past year.
- 5. The following collections have been accepted
 - ·Donations from the Military Nurses Helen Niskala
 - · Various photographs
 - Royal Columbian nurses uniform
 - ·Black bag (Public Health)
 - A variety of nursing books
 - ·Belt and pin documents

PLANS: Over the next year the committee plans to dialogue on strategies to pursue linkages with other Archival enterprises in British Columbia. Also the committee endeavours to have ongoing pictorial displays of holdings on the History of Nursing Website. This continues to be a work in progress.

THE STORY OF BLUEBIRD on my windowsill

Inspired by a bird perched on the windowsill of a Vancouver hospital, nurse Elizabeth Clarke wrote the 1948 hit song Bluebird On My Windowsill. The story of how this song came to be written has two versions.

Singer Jerry Gaynton shared the following account with History of Nursing

member Nina Rumen. "Elizabeth was working at Children's Hospital in Vancouver. One lovely spring day, as the children were watching birds through a hospital window, a bluebird tried to fly through the window, hit the glass and fell to the ground. The children were upset and Elizabeth retrieved the bird, put it in a box with a supply of food, water and a soft bed, and left it on the windowsill to recover. After watching the bird for several days it flew away and to comfort the children who missed their new friend, Elizabeth was inspired to write her song."

The second version was gathered from Lauri Lyster, drummer for a Vancouver female jazz quintet with vocals called Mother of Pearl where Bluebird is currently being featured in their performances. "Elizabeth Clarke was not a songwriter and had no intention of making music history when she went to work at Vancouver Children's Hospital one day in 1947. During her shift a sparrow happened to land on the windowsill and a young boy became very excited by this occurrence. Clarke, a nurse, was also a creative soul who liked to read stories and poems to her young charges. She transformed the sparrow into a bluebird and the tale of its arrival into a song."

The song found its way to Al Reusch, one of Vancouver and Canada's recording pioneers, Reusch, impressed by the optimism and emotion of the song, gave it to a local artist, Don Murphy to record. Shortly after, the popular Vancouver Group, The Rhythm Pals, cut a version that became a regional hit. The song found its way to Doris Day and then to Bing Crosby and dozens of others. It became the first Canadian written song to sell a million copies.

Elizabeth Clarke generously gave some of her royalties to the B.C. Children's Hospital. She wrote at least one other song "Picking Flowers", a minor hit, but nothing else she wrote ever approached the success of Bluebird. Little is known about Clarke's nursing background. If anyone has more information about this nurse song writer please contact the B.C. History of Nursing Group.

There's a Bluebird on your windowsill There's a rainbow in your sky There are happy thoughts your heart to fill Near enough to make you cry... And with every tear you've washed away All the things you've kept inside You count your joys this lovely day And you wonder why you cried. And if perchance your heart grows sad You still can't smile again And with every tear you've ever had Comes the sunshine after rain. The rainy days may come and go But the clouds still roll away Everything will come that you wish it so As an answer when you pray.

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The Shirley Dean Pavilion was formerly the King George Private Hospital and was purchased by Surrey Memorial Hospital in 1983

On October 29, 2003, the residents and their families of the Shirley Dean Extended Care Pavilion located on the campus of the Surrey Memorial Hospital in Surrey BC, were told their home would be closing in June 2005. The building was old despite the renovations that were done in 1993 but the residents/families loved the culture of caring and respect they experienced in the Shirley Dean Pavilion.

To prepare the residents for their move, the decommissioning team decided to develop a monthly Newsletter and highlight residents, staff and memories of their time at Shirley Dean. It was planned that each resident, as they moved to their new home, would be given a book of the Newsletters to take with them as a memento of their former home and friends.

The first question that arose in developing the articles for the newsletter was who was Shirley Dean ,the

person, and why was the Pavilion named in her honour. With the many changes in Health Authorities, no one could remember the person bit everyone felt it was important to find out who Shirley Dean was and to give her her rightful place in the history of Nursing.

A member of the decommissioning team located Shirley's daughter Janet on the internet and forwarded the information to me. I contacted Janet, and we met over lunch. Janet shared the memories she had of her mother when she nursed at Surrey Memorial Hospital. She also shared pictures and documentation that she had kept of her mother's work.

Shirley Dean was born in 1934 in Vancouver, BC. She grew up in East Vancouver on Turner Street. From a very early age, Shirley knew that she wanted to be a nurse. Janet shared the picture below of Shirley at age 3, dressed up and playing "nurse".

Shirley attended Britannia High School and entered training at the Vancouver General Hospital School of Nursing in 1952. She graduated from VGH in 1955. Janet shared her mother's graduation picture which was taken at a studio. She wore the graduation uniform of

white dress with long sleeves and starched bib, apron, collar and cuffs. The apron was distinctive as it was gathered at the waist with a waistband that was held together with four brass studs. At the neck, the VGH graduation pin was worn. On her head she wore the plain white cap of the School. The graduation pictures always portrayed the graduate with a bouquet of red roses and the diploma.

Shirley's graduation picture is an example of this tradition.

The graduation ceremony was held in the Queen Elizabeth Theatre and each graduate that night carried a real bouquet of red roses as she crossed the stage to receive her diploma signifying the completion of 3 hard years of work and study and the entrance into a noble and respected profession.

Following graduation, Shirley worked as a staff nurse at Surrey Memorial Hospital. She began in surgery and specialized in urology. She also developed a special interest in geriatric nursing. As she gained experience she moved to other areas of the hospital including emergency, and obstetrics. She was promoted to Head Nurse and worked to develop standards of care and quality assurance programs. Janet thinks her mother wrote a book on Geriatric Nursing and is in the process of tracking it to see if it exists. Janet describes her mother in the Head Nurse role as "running a tight ship." She made sure her patients received the best care and that nurses and doctors met high standards of care. Janet remembers her mother at night working on her typewriter preparing " care plans" to share her knowledge

with her nursing staff and improve the standard of care given to patients. Janet also remembers walking to Surrey Memorial Hospital to meet her mother after work each day and to ride home with her. She described this as special time between herself and her mother. Shirley was a single parent.

Janet shares a story about her mother's sense of humour. Shirley had always wanted a St. Bernard dog and the year before she died, she bought one. Many staff at Surrey lived on farms and one friend brought some leg bones from a cow into work for Shirley's dog. Shirley, being the practical nurse she was, took the bones to the morgue where she stored them for the day. When

Janet came to meet her that afternoon, her Mom took her to the morgue to pick up the bones. Janet was uneasy about believing the bones were from a cow!

At the age of 45, Shirley died of cancer while still holding the Head Nurse position at the hospital. She left behind, Janet who was only 16, and many colleagues who respected her greatly. When the hospital purchased the King George Private Hospital, they named in honour of Shirley Dean. This was based on the respect she had from her nursing and medical colleagues and her dedication to the nursing of the elderly. When asked why the Pavilion was named in her mother's honour, Janet replied, "In those days people really honoured and valued nurses."

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MEMBER news

GLENNIS ZILM has been named to receive the Medical Services Associated Incorporated (formerly called the Hannah Foundation for the History of Medicine) John B. Neilson/ Spaulding Award for 2004. The award, which was launched in 1984, is highly regarded, and this is the first time it had been opened to other than physician historians. The award goes to "a Canadian (not a professional historian) who has made a significant, continuing, long-standing contribution to the history of health care in Canada. It is made on the basis of contributions of high quality to the discipline, in the form of noteworthy historical publications, teaching, research, and service to the community of other significant endeavours."The award will be presented in the fall in Vancouver

HoN member, Shirley Stinson, wrote a letter of support to AMS, at the request of Dr Cynthia Toman, who was the Nominator. An excerpt follows: On the basis of my over 50 years of experience in health care agencies and academia in Canada and abroad, I would rank Glennis Zilm as the nurse who has made the most exemplary combined contributions to the development and promotion of the history of nursing in Canada. Put another way, there are several Canadian nurses who are excellent ... But I believe it is Glennis Zilm who best exemplifies what it is to make outstanding contributions in all these areas in continuing longstanding, substantive and integrated ways. I would add that a key characteristic of Glennis Zilm is that in making such significant contributions to the history of nursing, she has done so in a consistently principled way, with great discretion and modesty -- yet with a fine sense of humour.

DR. SHIRLEY STINSON, OC, one of our long-time and well-honored members, has received another award. In early May, she was named one of "100 Edmontonians of the Century" by the mayor and city council. She was one of about 1,000 persons nominated for the award, which celebrates Edmontons 100th birthday. The University of Alberta Alumni Association made the nomination for this tribute.

The citation recognizes that she was the first Alberta nurse to earn a doctoral degree and the first nurse to receive a joint appointment in both nursing and health sciences. The award also recognized her significant contributions in academic nursing research. Dr. Stinson holds many awards, including the Order of Canada, Alberta Order of Excellence, and Queens Golden Jubilee medal.

DR. BEVERLEY DU GAS, OC, one of our founding members, has written a collection of short stories about her time in Northern India with the World Health Organization. Aik Minute (an East Indian expression meaning "just a moment") was originally written for her family, but is being made available to others in a desk-top publishing format for \$15 a copy. Once printing costs are recovered, all proceeds will go to the B.C. History of Nursing Archival Fund. The book covers the years 1965 to 1967, when Bev left her job as Director of the School of Nursing at Vancouver General Hospital to set up nursing educational programs in northern India. The short stories featuring Bev and her family provide insights into Indian life and the trials and tribulations of an ex-patriot educator. CURRENT: ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL, VICTORIA - APRIL TO SEPT 2004

St. Joseph's School of Nursing Alumnae members Margaret Rapatz '55, Bea Sinclair '64, and Linda Betterman '64, travelled from Victoria on April 14th with may valuable artifacts in toe. Their display can be seen in the RNABC boardroom cabinet, lobby and library. Their display includes hospital and school of nursing pictures, portrait dolls, books and historical materials. Their display also includes many priceless artefacts loaned by the Victoria Medical Society.

St. Joseph's Hospital was established in Victoria, in 1875, by the Sisters of St. Ann. The hospital was administered by the Sisters until 1972 when it was renamed Victoria General Hospital and functioned on the original site until 1983. St. Joseph's Hospital School of Nursing was established by the Sisters of St. Ann in 1900. The first graduate was Anthony Williams. The school was administered by the Sisters until 1972 and continued as a training school until 1981. Be sure to catch this outstanding display the next time you are in the RNABC building.

Reviews

Nursing Illuminations: A Book of Days, by Patricia T. van Betten & Melissa Moriatry. St. Louis: Mosby, 2004. 776 pp. Copy available in the RNABC Library.

Those interested in nursing history will find this a book to buy, to keep on your desk, and to savor and enjoy each day. Modeled on the traditional "books of days," where a reader is encouraged to read a page a day, this imaginative volume contains succinct, interesting, informative biographies of 366 resourceful nurses throughout history. From Hildegard of Bingen (1098-1179) to nurses still living, the vignettes portray a wide range of contributions. Not all are famous nursing leaders; some extraordinary bedside nurses who played inspiring and significant roles are there as well.

Whenever possible, the nurse's birthday is used to arrange the listings. Each page then opens with a quotation from the nurse, followed by a brief narrative that illuminates the relevance of his or her contribution. A capsule resume follows, giving pertinent factual details, and a concise references and credits section offers resources that many will want to pursue. All the famous are there, but even dedicated nurse historians may find new names to delight and inspire. A number of Canadian nurses are included.

In the opening note to reader, writer and editor Suzanne Beyea, R.N., suggests reading one page aloud each morning as she did, sometimes to herself, or to family, colleagues, friends, students. This is great advice, for the stories and quotations captivate, and energize a passion for nursing.

Nursing Sisters: Honoring the women who have gone to war to save the lives of soldiers. (2003, December 9). Body and Health [Television broadcast episode 3-422]. Hamilton, ON: CH Broadcasting/ A CanWest Company. Available on Videotape from the RNABC Library. (14 minutes)

For those interested in military nursing history, a new videotape is available through the RNABC Library. Broadcast on the CH network's television program Body and Health last December, the show featured Dr. Cynthia Toman, a nursing historian and Nursing faculty member at the University of Ottawa (and one of the B.C. Group's Affiliate Members). Body and Healths regular host Colleen Walsh introduced the program, and Dr. Toman gave a wonderful synopsis of the history of Canada's military nurses, especially their roles in World Wars I and II. Dr. Toman stood by the Nursing Memorial Sculpture in the Parliament Buildings, and during her presentation the cameras showed many still photographs of nursing sisters in the war zones, mainly from WWII. As well, the show had shots of the Ottawa War Memorial and Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Scenes from the Ottawa Nursing Sisters Association's November 11 Reunion and Lunch are featured in the program, showing such well known nurses as Dr. Helen K. Mussallem and Harriet Sloan, both members of our B.C. Group. As well, two Ontario nurses from World War II were interviewed during the luncheon and these tapes incorporated into the broadcast.

The final segment of the show featured an interview between Host Walsh and Major Lee-Anne Quinn, a nursing officer with the Canadian Forces. Major Quinn has served for several years with the Canadian Forces. especially with our peacekeeping missions with the United Nations in Bosnia and in Somalia, where she was involved in air evacuations of wounded soldiers and civilians. - Reviewed by Glennis Zilm
