

The Past is Present to Guide the Future

Change is underway for the British Columbia History of Nursing Group. The provincial government's recent legislation establishing the Health Disciplines Act means that our History Group is no longer part of the College of Registered Nurses of British Columbia. We have embarked on a new path for the future.

The Past - The History of Nursing Group was organized in 1989 under the umbrella of the Registered Nurses Association of British Columbia and in partnership with the Canadian Association for the History of Nursing. Our goals have been to discover, disseminate and preserve the history of nursing in British Columbia. We have remained true to those goals for the past 20 years.

The Present - Today, the History Group has 140 members: active, affiliate and students. We have developed a variety of programs to promote nursing history. An archive fund was established to preserve nursing artefacts and records, and a scholarship fund supports student efforts to study and document nursing history. Other activities include continuing programs to collect biographies and oral histories, mounting nursing history displays, arranging interesting programs for members and the public, and partnerships with other historical societies. We circulate a newsletter 4 times a year and recently have expanded and upgraded our website to include several virtual exhibits.

The Future – The History Group recently became the British Columbia History of Nursing Society within the Societies Act of B. C. We have established our constitution and by-laws as an independent body according to the Societies Act. The future is challenging as we seek to carry out our established programs and embark on fund raising efforts to support our plans to preserve British Columbia's nursing history. We have a strong executive in place for 2009 and enthusiastic and capable members to chair our numerous committees.

But we will need the help of all our members to carry our plans into the future. We are counting on each one of you to assist us to reach our goals. Begin by renewing your membership for 2009, our 20th Anniversary year. Volunteer for one of our committees. Attend our monthly Executive meetings and network with friends. Share your individual research on pioneer nurses who have shaped nursing practice in this province.



ENJOY THIS BIOGRAPHY

You won't regret reading Daphne Sleigh's biography of Major James Skitt Mathews, long time Vancouver City Archivist. (Daphne Sleigh (2008) The Man Who Saved Vancouver: Major James Skitt Mathews. Heritage House ISBN 978-1-894974-39-4) This biography is believed to be the first of a Canadian Archivist.

Based on Major Mathew's own private papers which were sealed for 30 years after his death, the book shows a more personal side of his life. Of particular interest is his marriage to Emily Eliza Edwardes, a nursing sister who cared for him when he was ill with typhoid fever in 1902. Mathews saved records from her nursing service before and during World War 1 and added them to his own collection. After her death Mathews spent his money on a series of artistic tributes to Emily: namely a stained glass window in Christ Church Cathedral and a bronze bust of Emily which remained in his office until his death in 1970. The translated text is also being used in France, Spain, Mexico and all Spanish speaking countries in South America.

A Vancouver Sun newspaper reporter writes that starting in April 2009 professionals such as doctors, teachers and nurses will be able to transfer freely among all provinces in Canada without passing a new set of tests or certifications.
