CANADIAN ASSOCIATION FOR THE HISTORY OF NURSING CON-FERENCE

Events include the Hannah Lecture given by Dr. Anne Marie Rafferty on Friday June 23 and a luncheon workshop presented by Dr. K. McPherson on Saturday, June 24th. The banquet dinner on Saturday features a play on the life of Florence Nightingale staring Osolde O'Neill. The title of the play is: "The Lady with the Hammer".

UBC GETS RARE NIGHTINGALE BOOK

A rare book by Florence Nightingale — although one not credited to her — has been donated to the University of British Columbia's special collections. An article in *The Vancouver* Sun reported that Prof. Julian Davies, head of UBC's department of microbiology and immunology donated this book along with others originally collected by the department's first head, Dr. Claude E. Dolman.

The book, A Contribution to the Sanitary History of the British Army during the late War with Russig, was published in 1859. It describes the terrible conditions in the army hospitals in the 1854-1856 Crimean War and how Nightingale set about bringing in more hygienic practices. Prof. Davies told the Sun that as women "were not supposed to do anything" in those days the book was presented by the Surgeon General of the British Army, Nightingale's biographers have also credited her with preparation of this work as part of her post-war campaign to improve living and health conditions for the forces in the British Army .

Dr. Dolman, who died in December 1994, was acting head of UBC's Department of Nursing from 1936 to 1949, as Nursing was administered under the Department of Bacteriology during that period. The Sum reported that Dolman had donated his collection of more that 500 books to his old department which decided these should be part of UBC"s special collection as some of the books were worth thousands of dollars. The oldest was a first edition of a 1667 work by British scientist Robert Hooke.

NEWS FROM THE EXECUTIVE

THE ANNUAL MEETING

The fifth annual general meeting of the History of Nursing Professional Practice Group was held on Thursday, April 6, 1995 in the Lord Byron Room at the Hyatt Regency Hotel, Vancouver, B.C. with 32 members and guests attending. Greetings from the RNABC Board of Directors were extended by Gwen Kavanagh. Prior to the business meeting, members and guests had the chance to visit, enjoy coffee and refreshments, and view the display tables. Sheila Zerr brought the Memorial Doll collection and Glennis Zilm arranged a bulletin board and book display for our enjoyment.

Helen Niskala nominated Mary Richmond for Honorary Membership in the HON group and presented a summary of her professional career in nursing education, nursing research, nursing service, and nursing history. Recognition plaques were awarded by Helen Shore to Verna and Dick Splane for their writing the book "Chief Nursing Officer Positions in National Ministries of Health". Helen also presented recognition plaques to Glennis Zilm and Ethel Warbinek for their joint writing of "Legacy: History of Nursing Education at the University of British Columbia", Congratulations were extended to Esther Paulson on the occasion of her birthday (see picture story on pages 8 and 9).

Reports were received from the various committees and the main points are highlighted below:

 <u>Membership Committee</u> We have 85 members at present. An updated list will be mailed with the Fall newsletter.

Biographical Committee Forty-six

files have been completed: 23 are in the RNABC library. There were no nominations to the CNA Memorial Book this year. Criteria for inclusion in the B.C. Memorial Book are being developed.

- Oral History Four tapes have been added to the RNABC Library this year: two were received from the newly established Victoria History of Nursing Group.
- <u>Memorial Doll Collection</u> There are 9 dolls in the collection. This is our main source of money for the Scholarship fund. The criteria and procedure for awarding a scholarship is being developed.
- <u>Victoria Chapter</u> President Kari Moore reported on the organization and activities of the Victoria Group (see page 7 for a full report).
- International Conference Sheila Zerr and her committee have been very active planning for the 1997 conference. The site of the conference will be St. Paul's Hospital. Monique Begin has agreed to give the keynote address. Bev Du Gas will chair the abstracts committee. The following motions were passed:
- The B.C. History of Nursing Group co-sponsor with CAHN the International History of Nursing Conference.
- The B.C. History of Nursing Group loan \$1500 in 1995 and \$1500 in 1996 to the International History of Nursing Conference.

It is expected that this money will be recovered from the International Conference fees collected in 1997.

- Finance Committee Treasurer Nina Rumen presented a proposed budget for 1996 with anticipated revenues and proposed expenditures of \$3,100. The scholarship fund as of December 1994 totalled \$6,273.27. There are still 300 packages of note-cards for sale. The profit from this fund raiser is \$1,634.60.
- Nominating Committee Helen Shore presented the 5 nominees for the vacancies on the Executive. Don Ransom, Treasurer, has been an active member of the HON group since its inception, a member of the Finance Committee for 2 years, and member-at-large this past year. Shirley Holtzman, a faculty member working with the UBC nursing program, was elected Secretary. Lynne Esson, also a faculty member at UBC. was elected Member at large for a 2 year term. Rhondda Morrison, a recent graduate of the MSN program at UBC was elected for a 1 year term as Member at large. The new Membership coordinator is Anne Karl who has just completed a term as Secretary.

Outgoing executive members were recognized and thanked for their contributions: Glennis Zilm, Helen Niskala, Beverly Du Gas, Nina Rumen and Brenda Flynn.

The meeting concluded with a drawing for the book <u>"Legacy: His-</u> tory of Nursing Education at The University of British Columbia", won by Mary Richmond.

former teacher, administrator, and leader in British Columbia Nursing died peacefully on March 5. 1995 in St. Paul's Hospital. Although she graduated from the Galt School of Nursing in Lethbridge and received her Bachelor of Science Degree in Seattle, Audrey Murray-Coleman spent most of her long career in Vancouver at St. Paul's. For 24 years she was employed there in several positions including Nursing Instructor, Assistant Director of the School of Nursing, and latterly, before her retirement in 1979, as Director of Nursing.

Audrey was known for her very approachable manner and a willingness to always be open to new ideas. In her quiet realistic way she encouraged her staff to be involved in the "new trends" of those years...unit managers, ward clerks, extended work days, nursing workload index, to name a few. She was always supportive when initiating and delegating such projects, and helpful to staff in developing these new (for those days) concepts. Audrey promoted individual leadership potential, and became a "mentor" to many nurses. She was a member of the International honored Society of Nursing, Sigma Theta Tau,

VICTORIA CHAPTER NEWS

The incentive to organize a History of Nursing Victoria Chapter stemmed from the "Women in Nursing" display held at the Royal British Columbia Museum in October, 1994. News about the Victoria group's activities since then were reported at the HoN annual meeting by President Kari Moore, pictured below.



The first meeting of the Victoria History of Nursing (VHoN) group was held on January 30, 1995. The members present elected Kari Moore president and Laurie Johns secretary. Meetings are held the last Monday of each month at 10 am in the Roval Jubilee Nurses Alumni room. Victoria has a rich nursing history and the aim of the VHoN group is to try to capture some of that history on tape and as biographical data. Thus far, two oral histories have been done by member Laura Davison on nursing sisters Margaret Fletcher and Bernice Hatcher

relating their nursing experience both locally and abroad. Positive evaluation feedback on the quality of the tapes was given by *Sheila Zerr*, Chair of the Oral History Committee. This work will add important data to the RNABC collection.

Here are highlights from the VHoN meetings:

- January: the history, aims and focus of the HoN group were reviewed and the executive elected.
- February: Sister Margaret Cantwell gave a hands-on workshop on how to preserve photographs.
- March: Lawrie Johns gave a workshop on how to prepare for an oral history.

Sister Margaret Cantwell has graciously offered shelf space at the Sisters of St. Ann's Academy premises for the VHoN to use for the storage of archival material. The group plans to contact the Royal B.C. Museum, the archives of Victoria City and the University of Victoria to determine what, if any, nursing archival material is now being stored in these locations.

The Vancouver History of Nursing Group has recognized the Victoria Group as a separate committee and supports their excellent work with funding (\$100), sharing of minutes, and assistance with various projects. There are plans for a joint meeting of the two groups on September 23rd in Victoria. "Victoria has a rich nursing history. Our aim is to capture some of that history."

MARY RICHMOND RECEIVES HONORARY MEMBERSHIP IN THE B.C. HISTORY OF NURSING PROFESSIONAL PRACTICE GROUP

t the 5th Annual Meeting held on April 6, 1995 Helen Niskala nominated Mary Richmond for honorary membership stating "the person we are honoring today was born in and received her general and preparatory nursing education in Vancouver. She obtained a Bachelor of Nursing from McGill University, a Master of Arts from Columbia University, and an Honorary Doctorate (LLD) from the University of Victoria." Next Helen gave an overview of the many facets of Mary Richmond's distinguished nursing career which includes positions in staff nursing, middle and senior administration in health care and educational settings, faculty member in diploma, baccalaureate and masters nursing programs and consultant in educational matters, Mary's contributions to her professional associations are impressive including chair of the RNABC Committees on Nursing Education and Nursing Service and involvement with the corresponding national committees. She was co-founder of the Council of Hospitals with Schools of Nursing, a precursor to the Nursing Education Council of B.C.

Helen reviewed Mary's involvement with history of nursing noting that "our nominee has been a member and chair of the RNABC Oral History project and was very involved in the subsequent development of the History of Nursing Group. Her recording and analyzing of historical materials was a worthy contribution to Street's biography of Ethel Johns, and to Zilm & Warbinek's book Legacy, the recently published history of nursing education at the University of British Columbia." Helen stated "as one of her former McGill undergraduate students I can testify to her meticulous and wide ranging interest in nursing history and its relationship to other societal events. Using an Aristotelian approach, she challenged many of us to be inquisitive about the far reaching impact of nursing history."

In her leisure time Mary is an ardent bird watcher, has been involved with the Victoria Natural History Society and the Cubbon Adult Day Care Center. In her professional and personal life she continues to demonstrate a curiosity about history in general and nursing history in particular.

HISTORY OF NURSING RECOGNITION PLAQUES AWARDED AT 5TH ANNUAL MEETING

Helen Shore presented recognition plaques to Glennis Zilm and Ethel Warbinek for their book Legacy: History of Nursing Education at the University of British Columbia, 1919-1994. The authors tell the history of a distinguished institution by organizing the story around the terms of the School's six nursing directors.

Glennis is a graduate of the UBC School of Nursing who went on to a career as writer, editor and journalist. Ethel, also a UBC graduate, was on faculty in the School of Nursing for many years until her recent retirement this year. Both are active members in provincial and national history of nursing associations.

The authors present a historical perspective showing the development of this position from the time of Florence Nightingale. Verna Splane was a Principal Nursing Officer with the Canadian Department of National Health and Welfare as well as having a distinguished career in national and international health organizations. Dick Splane is professor emeritus from UBC who was a public official in the Canadian Department of Health and Welfare. He has had a rich background in community service including the presidency of many provincial, national and international organizations in the field of social work and social development.

THE MILITARY NURSES OF CANADA contains photographs and personal recollections of Canadian military nurses from World War 1 to present day active nurses. Included is a history of the beginning of Canadian military nursing during the 1885 North

A Military Nurse Remembers West Rebellion. The book is edited by *Edith Landells*, a military nurse during World War II who chose to compile this book as a retirement project. The author used

personal interviews and War Diaries at the National Archives, Ottawa, but mostly relied on Nursing Sisters Associations and word of mouth to reach military nurses in every Canadian province.

The book is co-published with Addison Graphics, White Rock. It is expected to be ready for sale by June 1995, the 50th anniversary of the end of World War II and the year "Canada Remembers." -The cost is \$30.00 plus \$3.50 forpostage and handling. INFORMATION ON HISTORY OF NURSING IN NEW TEXTBOOKS

The new Nursing Foundations textbook by Beverly Witter Du Gas and

HISTORY OF NURSING NEWS

Emily Knor (both B.C. nurses), published in April 1995 by Appleton and Lange Canada (Simon & Schuster) contains some interesting bits of Canadian nursing history. Bev Du Gas is a past president of the B.C. HoN group and in the Canadian Association for the History of Nursing. She is author or co-author of a whole series of these basic nursing texts dating back to the 1960's.

The book is one of those huge (1.320 pages) basic first-year texts. The short opening chanter gives a brief introduction to history of nursing. As well, the first half of the book contains a "baker's dozen" of short "vignettes" on some well-known and not-so-well-known individuals who have made contributions to nursing history in Canada by Glennis Zilm of the B.C. HoN Group. She reports that she enjoyed doing them and particularly likes the one on Evaline Mary Pemberton (1875-1949). Miss Pemberton was president of the Graduate Nurses Association of Nova Scotia when that province passed the Registered Nurses Act and her official certificate was number One-making her the first "registered nurse" in Canada. The vignettes may help first-level nursing students become a bit aware of the nursing personalities that make up our history.

Three other members of the B.C History of Nursing Group were contributors to or reviewers for the Du Gas and Knor textbook—Linda Gomez, Anne Karl, and Sheila Zerr.

The forthcoming (mid or late June) textbook on community health nursing in Canada—Community Nursing: Promoting Canadians' Health, edited by Miriam J. Stewart of Dalhousie—opens with two chapters on the history of community health nursing. The first chapter is by Margaret Allemang, the founding president of the Canadian Association for the History of Nursing. She provided an updated version of her chapter that appeared in the earlier version of this book (Community Health Nursing in Canada) in 1985. The second history of nursing chapter is by Ginette Rodger and Sheila Gallagher of Alberta and

covers events affecting community health nursing from about 1980 to present. Submitted by Glennis Zilm

(and maybe even in Canada) at St. Joseph's Hospital in Comox over nurses' demands for an eighthour working day.

 Year federal Medical Care Insurance program went into effect (July1), with only two provinces (B.C. and Saskatchewan) qualifying by following the four basic principles of comprehensiveness, universality, portability, and public administration.
Year the last hospital-based nursing education program in B.C. (Vancouver General Hospital) closed to new students and merged with the University of British Columbia.

4. Year the Sisters of St. Ann arrived in Victoria to administer health care and education. The first "trained" nurses in what is now B.C., they had travelled by ship down the east coast, by train across the Isthmus of Panama, and up the west coast by boat.

 Year the <u>Survey of Nursing Education</u> in Canada by U.B.C. Education Professor Dr. George M. Weir, commissioned by the Canadian Nurses Association and Canadian Medical Association, is released. This landmark report called for striking changes in the education of nurses, and is still quoted today.

 Year the Graduate Nurses Association of B.C. was established, the forerunner of the Registered Nurses Association of B.C. (RNABC)
Year that the formal separation of the labor relations division from the RNABC occurred.
RNABC retained statutory/regulatory functions and the B.C. Nurses Union (BCNU) was created to take care of economic/union functions.

 Year B.C. got a <u>Registered Nurses Act</u>, thanks to lobbying efforts of the Graduate Nurses Association of B.C.

 Year the first university nursing education program in Canada (and in all the British Empire) was established at the University of B.C.

 Year the first public health legislation was passed in B.C.; a medical health officer was appointed and sanitation regulated.
