A Celebration of Women's History

From May to October 1997 12 cases in the Woodward Biomedical Library featured History of Nursing displays prepared by members of the B.C. History of Nursing Group. Members wished to recognize nursing history during the International History of Nursing Conference and the International Council of Nurses (ICN) Congress, held in Vancouver during the month of June. In addition the group wished to honor the contribution of nurses during "Women's History

month", recognized by the Canadian government and celebrated this past October.

A special program meeting was held on the UBC campus in early October. After an orientation to the displays, the 25 members at the meeting enjoyed a visit to the library foyer. There they viewed a wall display honoring Ethel Johns, and 4 cases highlighting the life and contributions of Florence Nightingale. Another case showed the influence of European nursing orders and the contribution of Mme. Marie Rollet Hebert (1617), Canada's first nurse. Early nursing in B.C. was shown in a display featuring the four Sister's of St. Ann (1858), the Royal Engineers military hospital in New Westminster and B.C.'s first school of nursing at the Royal Jubilee Hospital (1890-91). Other cases displayed early texts written by Canadian and B.C. nurses, the first VON nurses in B.C. and Vancouver, local nurses' monuments, and plans for an international distance education course on 'Historical Trends in Norsing'

The cases were skillfully prepared by History of Nursing members Janet Gormick, Jill Thompson, Glennis Zilm, Sheila Zerr and Brenda Flynn. Thanks are also extended to the librarians and staff of the Woodward Biomedical Library, especially Dr. Lee Perry, for assistance and support with this project.

We Remember.....

Geri LaPointe, president of RNABC from 1973-1975 passed away on March 13, 1997 at the age of 64.

Geri's accomplishments were many. Her nursing career began in 1953 when she graduated from the School of Nursing in Fort William (Thunder Bay) Ontario. In 1956 she moved to Kamloops, started out as an instructor in the Royal Inland Hospital School of Nursing, and ultimately became head of the School. In 1974 when the nursing program moved to the University College of the Cariboo, LaPointe worked in administration at the Royal Inland Hospital until her retirement in 1991.





Frances Benedict died on September 7, 1997 at the age of 95. Frances had a long distinguished career as a high school teacher and nurse educator. She graduated with a B.A. from UBC in 1923 (a Great Trekker) and from the Faculty of Education at UBC and the Vancouver Normal School. After additional graduate studies and employment teaching high school in several B.C. communities, she fulfilled a long-held ambition to become a nurse. Frances graduated from St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing in 1936 with honors and the highest marks in the provincial R.N. exams.

Frances Benedict served as educational director at St. Paul's Hospital School of Nursing in Vancouver for 10 years and at the Royal Columbian Hospital School of Nursing in New Westminster for 20 years until her retirement. In addition she was honorary clinical instructor in the UBC School of Nursing serving as field guide to nursing students practicing teaching in nursing schools.

Gwendolyn Elizabeth (Betty) Trainer died on September 22, 1997 at 76 years of age. Betty was a graduate of the Montreal General Hospital School of Nursing and did post-graduate training at the Sloan Hospital for Women in New York. She had a lengthy career as an obstetrical nurse in Montreal, Victoria and Vancouver. While living in the Yukon Territory she was a Director of Pacific Giant Steel Corporation and founder of Yukon Native Arts, a life skills program for native youth. While living in Ottawa, Betty was co-founder of the Tweedsmuir Center, an organization that pioneered the use of megavitamins in the treatment of mental and behavioral disorders.

Thurley Mary Duck, age 68, passed away on September 26, 1997 at the Cowichan District Hospital in Duncan B.C. She graduated from the Royal Jubilee Hospital School of Nursing in 1951. She completed post-graduate work in psychiatric nursing at Allen Memorial Institute in

Montreal and earned her B.N. degree at McGill University.

During her nursing career Duck held several positions at the Vancouver General Hospital: Assistant Supervisor, Centennial Pavilion, Building Supervisor, Heather Pavilion and Director of Nursing Administration. After serving several years as an RNABC Board member and Vice-President, she became the 24th President of the RNABC.

Our sincere condolences to the family and friends of these nursing leaders who have contributed so richly to our nursing heritage.

New Brunswick Village's Heritage Honored

The Chamber of Commerce of the village of Florenceville and the Nurses Association of New Brunswick joined together recently to celebrate their shared heritage. The two organizations have endorsed a proposal for a plaque to honor Florenceville's namesake, Florence Nightlingale.

In 1855 New Brunswick Lieutenant Governor L. A. Wilmot named the community, previously known as Buttermilk Creek on the west side of the St. John River and Buckwheat Flats on the east side. Wilmot decided that the settlement deserved a name more benefiting its dynamic, progressive nature. He found in Florence Nightingale the characteristics to describe the community.

The campaign to recognize the village's origins is led by Fredericton archivist and nurse historian, Arlee Hoye-McGee who recently attended the village's annual business and trade show dressed as Florence Nightingale. She and others organized a display of nursing memorabilia as part of the Chamber of Commerce booth.

"Miss Nightingale's image of a dedicated, motivated, organized statistician and administrator is synonymous with the history of the community which bears her name," said Hoyr-McGre. "A plaque to recognize Florenceville's origin would benefit both the village and nursing."

Florenceville has adopted the Florence Nightingale lamp as the village symbol. However, the logo is the municipality's only visible connection to the famous nurse. Enhancing the Nightingale image is seen as a tourist draw for the community.
