They sang excerpts from famous operas such as Carmen, The Magic Flute and Don Giovanni. We were so impressed with the

quality of the singing and the students' professionalism.

What a thrill – the opening of the anticipated opera – Florence: The Lady with the Lamp by Canadian composer Timothy Sullivan and librettist Anne McPherson performed by the UBC School of Music, Voice & Opera Division. It was directed by Nancy

It was such a pleasure to have Timothy Sullivan present at this memorable concert.

We were all saddened to learn of the death of Janet Gormick who was a long standing member of the Archives Committee.

#### **GOAL**

Our goal is to have a provincial history of nursing center in the Lower Mainland that is linked online with other agencies and /or schools of nursing in the province holding nursing artifacts or other archival materials. The provincial center will be an archival museum with easy access for nurses and the general public. It will house our provincial nursing archives, oral history tapes, biographies of our nursing leaders, and artifacts that we have collected. It will also include a virtual museum online and an online catalogue of artifacts and other archival items held by the BC History of Nursing Group, as well as those held by other BC agencies.

#### **OBJECTIVES**

The Archival Committee initiatives are the second most important function of the History of Nursing Professional Practice Group. The long-term objective is to establish a "Home of Our Own" as outlined in our goal above.

#### SHORT-TERM OBJECTIVES FOR THE YEAR 2006/7:

- 1. Maintain the processes and collections for Archival donations to the BC History of Nursing Group: and update the database.
- 2. Begin clearing the UBC office of nursing books and transfer them to the UBC Archives as a storage strategy for our collections.
- 3. Hire a new archivist.
- 4. Review and update the Finding Aid for General Collections
- 5. Review the BC History of Nursing Policy and Procedures Manual and add the Policy and Procedure for PPG's.
- 6. Collect documents and completed transfer forms from executive members and committee chairs and add to intra archival material.
- 7. Determine the best way to care for and store the collection of uniforms.

#### **ACTIONS**

- 1. Three meetings were held through 2005/6. One meeting was held at the Special Collections branch of the UBC Archives with Chris Hives (Head of UBC Archives).
- 2. The Archives continues to receive requests for information though our website and Voice Mail in the UBC Office.

#### **PLANS**

The Archives is always a work in progress. We continually receive materials from nurses, their families and colleagues, which makes our collection valuable. Over the years more nurses and the public have become aware of our archives. It is now gaining recognition among the nursing community. Plans for our website include pictures and information about the archival collection.

#### THANK YOU

A special thank you to Melanie Hardbattle (Archivist), who for over four years maintained our Archives, taught us various aspects of archival priorities and principles. She built a foundation for our collection which places our nursing treasures on a solid base for a future "Home of Our Own.' Thank you also goes out to all who have donated to the Archives and committee members: Janet Gormick, Don Ransom, Helen Niskala and Michelle Rooney who help maintain the workings of the committee.

The plan to develop part of our web-site into a virtual museum is in the formative stages. The team of guest editors produced 4 newsletters during the 2005-2006 calendar year. We continue to enjoy the variety of formats and focus in each edition. The Editorial Board instituted two changes: the newsletter volume and issues now correspond with the calendar year and our financial year (January to December), and the size of the newsletter paper changed from legal to tabloid (11 by 17).

Thanks to Ethel Warbinek, Glennis Zilm, and Naomi Miller for their work as guest newsletter editors. Anita Warbinek once again assists us with the design of some editions and Genelle Liefso provides us with the mailing labels. Once again, thanks to all the members of the History Group who regularly submit news items, book reviews, stories and articles for publication. This is much appreciated.



Katy Penner was born in a Mennonite colony in the Ukraine, arrived in Saskatchewan in 1926, grew up in the Depression years, finished high school by correspondence then took nurses training in Winnipeg. She graduated as an RN plus Bachelor of Religious Education in 1952. She immediately signed up to work in the Belgian Congo. This posting required studies in Belgium to learn tropical medicine and to speak French. She came second in a class of 86 nurses and sailed for Africa in August 1953.

First came public health internship in Leopoldville (now Kinshasa) covered vaccination programs, water and sanitation, plus record keeping. From there she went to a busy hospital in Kikwit where the volume of patients necessitated speedy procedures. Example: 8 hernia repairs done in 4

hours by the same surgeon wearing the same gown, using instruments rinsed but not sterilized while one nurse or aide tried to shoo flies off the surgical field. Lesson Two was to learn the lab work to calculate medication doses for trypanosomes in spinal fluid. That was followed by actually doing spinal taps with the patient seated on a stool and the nurse on her knees on the floor. Other lessons were designed to show the way to do as much as possible with few supplies, medicine and personnel.

The next move was to her first bush posting. She was driven over a road barely worthy of the

name, arrived at dusk, had her first emergency call at midnight and discovered that her newly learned French would not suffice. She needed to learn Bantu.

Four months later she was transferred to Kajiji. There the dispensary and most of the mission residences had been lost to a fire. Her new duties included directing the building of a large ward made of bamboo with thatched grass roof and walls. Nurses and aides were men. No girls were allowed. Penner and a series of white medical missionaries adapted to local foods, customs, climate and the people. For almost ten years they worked comfortably together, feeling welcomed into a family atmosphere.

The Liberation movement began in 1960. Many missionaries left the Congo and returned to

their homes. Penner was one of the last to leave and the first to return. The author was driven from her work three times by rebels, yet responded to calls to serve whenever and wherever needed in the new country of Zaire.

In 1976 she returned to Saskatchewan to care for ailing family. She arranged to complete her degree and immediately went on staff at the University of Saskatchewan School of Nursing. In 1982 she returned to the Congo to start a new school of nursing. Previously all nurses in the Congo had been men but finally women were permitted to attend classes.

Miss Penner is now retired and living in Kelowna next door to HoN member Ferne Trout (Ed. Ferne Trout died on March 24, 2006). Katy Penner lived a very full life, undertaking nursing duties in

conditions unfamiliar to her Canadian peers. Her story is very interesting. In some chapters medical and church activities flow concurrently. Some later chapters concentrate on various Christian mission endeavors. Some chapters contain mini biographies of the Congolese stalwarts who worked with her. (The names of those individuals are tongue twisters for me.) She concludes with a thumbnail history of the Congo/Zaire. Her work was proof read by friends but might have benefited by guidance from a professional editor.

# Faculty of Nursing on the Move Reviewed by Marring

Geertje Boschma. Faculty of Nursing on the Move: Nursing at the University of Calgary, 1969-2004. University of Calgary Press, 2005, 291p.

This book describes in detail the history of the University of Calgary's nursing program from its beginnings in 1969. In a 1964 report on nursing education in Canada, Dr Helen Mussallem commented: "Unless more and better-qualified nursing personnel are prepared, new health programs, or an expansion of present ones, may be seriously hampered." Dr Boschma sets forth in a scholarly fashion the many faceted responses to this report and describes with great accuracy, the cultural beliefs, the nature of nursing, and the place of women in Canadian society in the 1960s. She chronicles controversial issues surrounding university education for nursing and also the political climate in building an accurate recreation of the environment in which the School of Nursing at the University of Calgary was inaugurated.

It is within this historic setting that the principal players in the establishment of the Bachelor of Nursing program are introduced. The decisive impetus for the program came from the Alberta Association of Registered Nurses, which considered that the best approach was a four-year integrated baccalaureate degree program. Under the leadership of Director Shirley Good and her faculty, a curriculum incorporating the notion of "patient-centred" care was developed and a group of 50 students entered the first year of the program in the fall of 1970. The difficulties faced by the faculty both as nurses and as women, again in the context of the political and social attitudes of 1969-1970 and the politics within the university, are described in detail. The first class graduated in May 1974 and in 1979 the first post-diploma class graduated. In 1974, Marguerite Schumacher instigated a theory-based curriculum in line with the current philosophical approach toward nursing. Constant change was the order of the day regarding research, graduate education, and affiliation with diploma programs. The ongoing discussions about the changes, challenges, and advances are discussed in detail, giving the reader fascinating insights into tensions and decision-making over the years.

In 1979 Margaret Scott Wright became Dean, bringing with her a wealth of experience from her work in Britain and Canada. Under her leadership the graduate program was developed. Having already introduced such a program at Dalhousie University, Dr Scott Wright had the expertise to accomplish this feat in the Calgary setting. Throughout her tenure, many changes took place in all programs related to the increasing acuity of critically ill patients. Many new approaches such as articulation and affiliation, distance learning, and a learning resource centre were established during this time. In 1985 Dr Joy Calkin became Dean. Under her leadership, the undergraduate program came into focus again as well as an initiative toward affiliation, articulation, and integration of diploma and degree programs. Nursing research became another important focus, with Shirley Stinson, Margaret Scott Wright, and Joy Calkin as lead players. Commitment to nursing practice and to community service remained strong amongst faculty. Again, all this activity is portrayed against the political and financial climate in Alberta in the 1980s. Many more changes took place under the leadership of the new Dean, Dr Janet Storch during the severe restraints of the 1990s. The specific restraints of this period are well documented with increasing emphasis on the political climate. At this time, increased need for advanced academic preparation for faculty became an issue; the underlying reasons are well documented, again examining the issue in light of other women faculty in the university. In 1997, Dr. Deborah Tamlyn became Dean bringing new ideas and initiatives, including the first regular doctoral program and a nurse practitioner program. These changes reflect changing attitudes and social issues of the late 20th and early 21st century.

This most readable and interesting book is of great value for anyone interested in trends and changes in nursing in the last 35 years for it consistently places events within an historic context. Throughout the book, faculty's previous credentials and contributions are recorded making fascinating reading about many well known nursing leaders. Throughout, concurrent events give the reader insight into the triumphs and setbacks of the remarkable achievement of establishing a university nursing program.

## elebrating Glennis Zilm

Kwantlen University College celebrated its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year and we were so pleased to hear that our very own Glennis Zilm would be receiving an Honorary Doctor of Letters at the convocation Ceremony on May 30, 2006. The following is taken from the Convocation Connections: Special Edition May 30, 2006.

Over her 46-year career, **Glennis Zilm** has effectively combined nursing practice, education, and journalism into her work as a researcher and advocate of nursing history in BC and across Canada.

For her many immeasurable contributions to the betterment of her profession and her peers, Kwantlen University College recognized Glennis Zilm with an Honorary Doctor of Letters (Honoris Causa) at the 2006 convocation ceremony

"I love being able to combine my careers as a nurse and a journalist. I have had many widely different work experiences since I graduated largely because I am willing to take a risk and try something a bit different. I am deeply honoured to accept this honorary degree, and in turn, thank work I do."

Glennis was born in Saskatchewan and was raised in New Westminster, BC. In 1958, she graduated with a Bachelor and Glennis Zilm of Science in Nursing from UBC. A few years later she studied journalism at Carleton University and in 1982, received her Master of Arts and Communication from SFU. Now semi-retired, she continues to write and keeps herself busy with her own projects.

When asked about her greatest accomplishment, the Surrey/White Rock resident values many but considers her 2004 John B. Neilson Award from Associated Medical Services (formerly the Hannah Foundation) the most rewarding as it is given annually to a non-professional historian who promotes preservation of health care history in Canada. Glennis was the first Canadian nurse to be honoured in this manner.

Other achievements she values relate to her work as a journalist with the Canadian Press (CP). Glennis worked with the wire service in various parts of Canada, including covering football games and figure skating in Edmonton and science on Parliament Hill. "It was a great opportunity and privilege to be one of the few women journalists on Parliament Hill at the time," says Glennis. A highlight of those journalistic days was two trips to Canada's far north. Glennis was one of a select group to accompany then – Governor General Roland Michener on a special summer tour of the Artic.

Even as a beginning journalist, Glennis had the honour of having some of her nursing articles appear in journals around the world – including one translated into Japanese.

As a tireless advocate for nursing historical research, Glennis wants to instil a love of history in the next generation of health care professionals. Twice a year, she meets with Kwantlen nursing students, often in costume as Mrs. Miller, the first nurse to serve with Canada's military forces. Her goal is to inspire students by making them aware of how individual nurses of the past have shaped nursing history.

"I hope that Kwantlen students take away a belief that they are agents of change," says Glennis. "I look out over a room full of fledgling nurses, knowing that each and every one of them will likely save many lives." Glennis is a shining example of what an "ordinary nurse" can do. Drawing from history, her experiences and those of her classmates 50 years ago, Glennis inspires students who may not realize that they have the power within themselves to be extraordinary.

"I would like to tell all this year's Kwantlen graduates that they possess this power – and to go out and make use of it! And remember to have fun too!"

#### **ROSE MURAKAMI**

We were so shocked to learn that Rose Murakami's house on Salt Spring Island burned to the ground on Friday May 5, 2006. Fortunately Rose, her brother Richard and sister Violet got out safely. They lost everything including irreplaceable family photos and all personal belongings. The fire which began around 6 AM, spread quickly so that by the time the volunteer fire fighters arrived on the scene, it had engulfed the entire home.

The Murakami family has been pioneer residents of Salt Spring since the turn of the last century. During WWII they were interned in the interior of BC and later in Alberta. They lost their home and all possessions. By 1954, the family had raised enough money to return to Salt Spring. By sheer determination and hard work they purchased property on Rainbow Road and



established a successful farm, starting all over from scratch. This is the house that was destroyed in the fire.

Presently Rose and her family are living in a trailer on the property awaiting the rebuilding of the family home. As Rose wrote in her book Ganbaru: the Murakami Family of Salt Spring Island, published last year, "With dignity and courage, our parents brought the family safely through some terrible, terrible times in our journey through life and ensured that our family prevailed." Knowing Rose, she will overcome this recent set back and the family will be reunited in their newly built home. A trust fund - the "Murakami Fire Friendship Trust" has been established by the Salt Spring community.

## Janet Gormick

OCTOBER 12, 1940 - APRIL 27, 2006

anet Gormick, a long standing member of our History of Nursing Group, died on April 27, 2006, following a courageous struggle with adrenal cancer. The last few weeks of her life were spent on the Palliative Care Unit at the Vancouver General Hospital. Close friends stayed with her for comfort and support.

For the past several years Janet chaired the biographical committee, collecting valuable information on many BC nurses. The number of files increased under her watch. She also sat on the Archives Committee and was strong advocate for the preservation of nursing history. She, along with her dear friend Helen Shore, promoted the dream of a "Home of our Own", a permanent site for a nursing history museum and archives. Shortly before her death, she made a generous \$10,000.00 donation to our Archival Development Fund. This money is to be used for a permanent archives and /or to be matched by fund raising.

Janet enjoyed a lifelong career in Professional Nursing beginning in 1958 at St. Joseph's Hospital


School of Nursing, Syracuse, NY where she nursed in paediatrics following graduation. In 1964, she completed a Bachelor of Science with a major in Public Health Nursing in a joint program at the Upstate Medical Centre and Syracuse University. Janet then helped open the first Psychiatric Daycare Unit in North America at St. Joseph's where she served first as Head Nurse and then Supervisor for 3 years. She then began teaching paediatric and psychiatric nursing in one of President Lyndon Johnson "Great Society" Manpower Programs. In 1971 she completed a Master of Nursing program at UCLA as a Psychiatric Clinical Nurse Specialist and a Post Masters Community Mental Health Consultant program. At UCLA Professor Dr. Muriel Uprichard (who was moving to UBC as Director of the School of Nursing) invited Janet to teach Psychiatric Nursing at UBC for one year. Thus began Janet's 26 year career at UBC during which time she was involved in development of a UBC model for nursing, theory development and curriculum building as well as clinical practice in psychiatry, community and family health at both the undergraduate and graduate level. As a 26 year member of the Canadian Association of University Schools of Nursing, she served 8 years as Vice-President, President and Past-President of the Western Region and received an Honourary Life Membership upon retirement.

In addition to her involvement in our group, Janet was a member of the Vancouver Historical Society, Friends of the Vancouver City Archives and the VGH "Save Heather" Society. She was also a member of the planning group for the Bladder Care Centre and Regional Programs for the Vancouver Coastal Health Region. She swam for 20 years on Saturday mornings with a group at C.G. Brown Pool in Burnaby

A memorial service was held on May 5, 2006 at the University Golf Club. Two scholarships have been established in Janet's name. One will be awarded to a student in the basic Undergraduate Program and the other to a student in the Masters Program. Cheques can be sent to the UBC School of Nursing and made out to the JANET GORMICK SCHOLAR-SHIP FUND. Donations can also be made to the Palliative Care Unit Fund, Vancouver General Hospital Foundation

We will miss Janet's laughter, her good sense of humour, her wit and most of all her steadfast devotion to finding a permanent home for our nursing archives.

## M. Ferne Trout

1919 - 2006

argaret Ferne Trout once noted that, in retrospect, some of her nursing experiences seemed almost unbe lievable – but she enjoyed every moment and her career was "all I ever dreamed of and more." A long-time member and supporter of the B.C. History of Nursing Group, she spent considerable time in her retirement composing her memoirs. (Copies will be available in the CRNBC Library and the Group's Archives.)

Born in Saskatchewan in 1919, she spent her childhood on remote homesteads in the Cariboo district and other parts of central B.C. She entered the University of B.C. when she was barely 17 and graduated with a B.A. in 1939, then entered the School of Nursing and graduated in 1943. She had a roving and varied career that took her into prominent positions throughout B.C. and Canada.

During her student years at Vancouver General Hospital, she contracted tuberculosis and spent six months in Tranquille Sanatarium. Following graduation, she was offered a job with the Division of TB Control to run the new affiliation program – the first provincial compulsory TB affiliation in Canada for <u>all</u> student nurses. In 1948, she left the Division and moved into a number of innovative positions, including a one-year stint as a travelling instructor for the Registered Nurses Association of B.C.; this was an early continuing education course designed to help nurses keep current on advances in nursing. From 1952-1954, she was Assistant Director of Nursing at Pearson Hospital in Vancouver, which had opened to care for an influx of TB patients following World War II but which was now being converted into a hospital for patients with long-term, chronic care conditions, including poliomyelitis.

After leaving Pearson, she once again moved through a variety of senior positions, including Director of Nursing Education at Royal Inland Hospital in Kamloops, then Director of Nursing at Penticton Regional Hospital and later Lions Gate Hospital in North Vancouver. She took a one-year special course offered by the University of Toronto in Hospital Administration in 1964. Following her time at Lions Gate, she was appointed a surveyor and later Associate Executive Director for the Canadian Council on Hospital Accreditation. The Council set standards for and accredited hospitals all across Canada. She later wrote that "the Council was the greatest challenge of my career" but she was given opportunities to use her organization, planning, and writing skills. Her next career move was as Director of Patient Services at Shaughnessy Hospital in Vancouver from 1978 to 1980, and her final move was as Director of Special Projects at Vancouver General Hospital from 1980-1983.

She retired in 1983 first to Penticton and later to Kelowna, and, despite health problems, continued to lead an active life. She travelled widely, including a safari to Africa when she was in her 80s. She died peacefully in Kelowna on March 24, 2006.
